

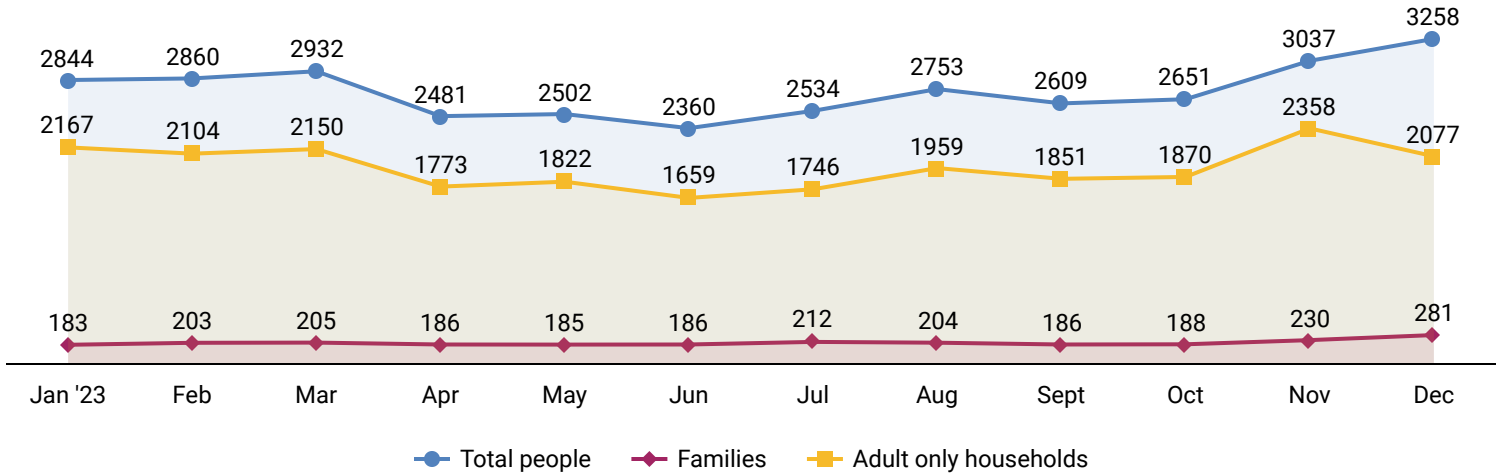
Nashville Homelessness Data, December 2023

*This data does not include information from the Nashville Rescue Mission or the Domestic Violence Coordinated Entry process.

3,258 people experienced homelessness in Nashville in **December 2023**. These 3,258 people were in **2,358 households; 281 families** and **2,077 adult only households**. Over the past 12 months, **8,272 unique people** have experienced homelessness in Nashville.

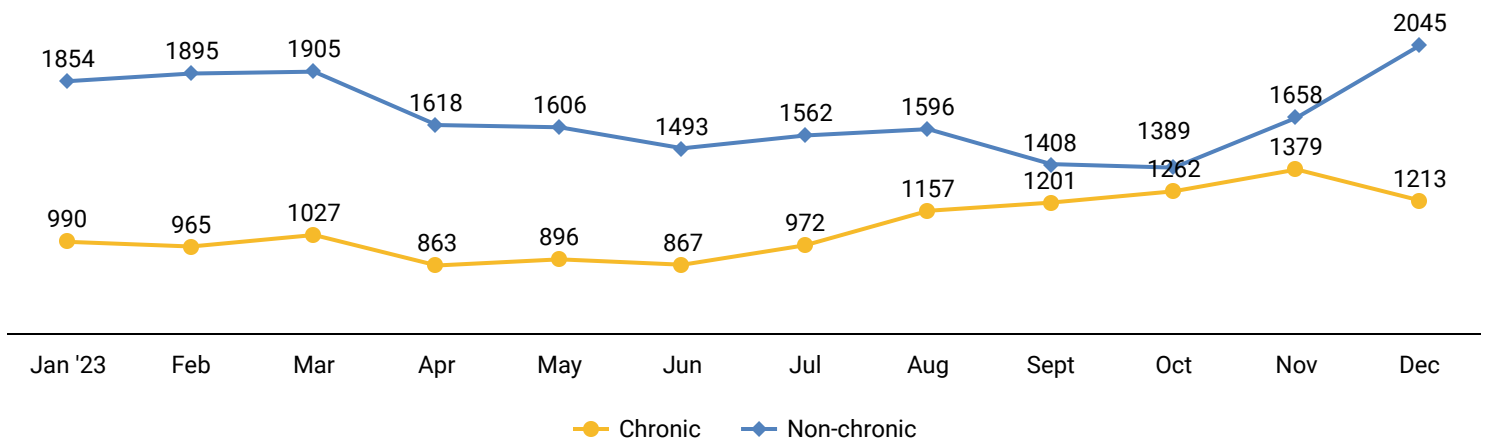
↓ **1,213 (37%)** are experiencing chronic homelessness

↑ People who live in shelter have been experiencing homelessness for an average of **3 years and 8.5 months**

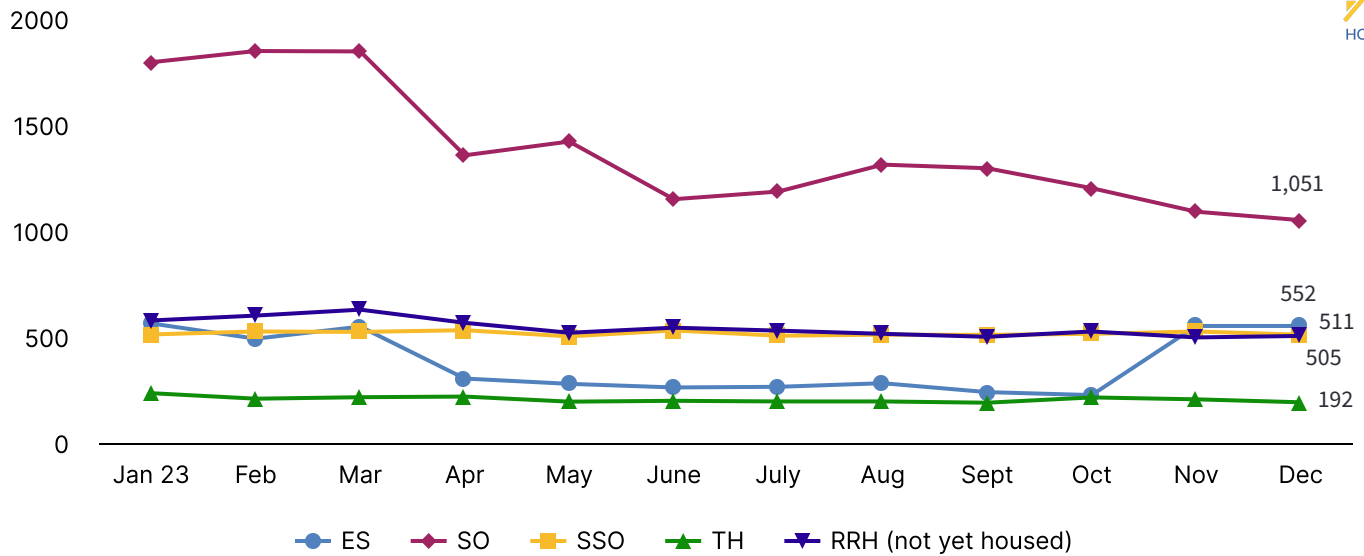
Number of people experiencing chronic homelessness over time



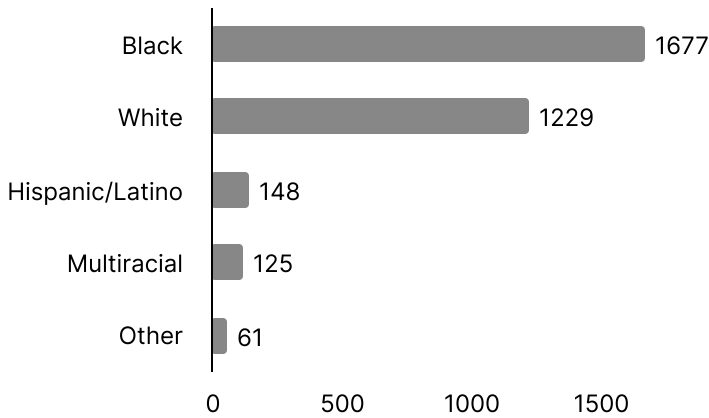
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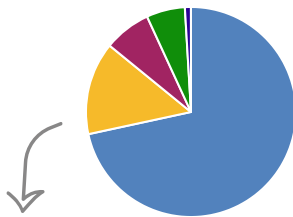
Number of people experiencing homelessness by program type, over time



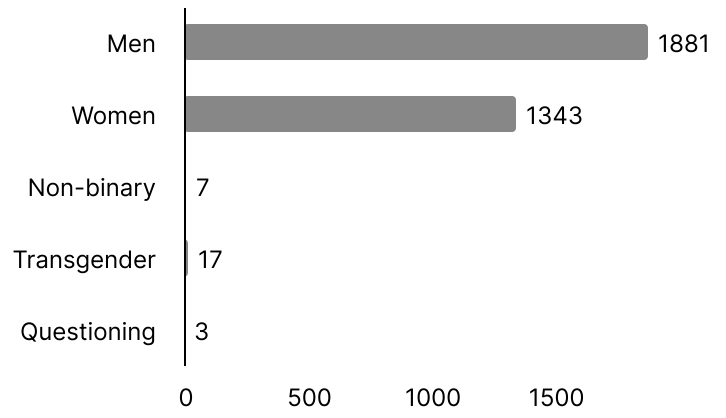
In December, **552** people experiencing homelessness were served in Emergency Shelters, **1,051** in Street Outreach, **192** in Transitional Housing, **511** in Supportive Services only, and **505** in Rapid Re-Housing who had not yet been housed.



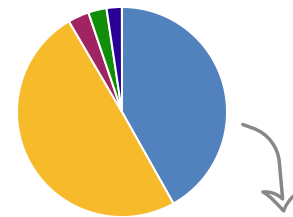
In **December**, **51%** of people experiencing homelessness were Black, **38%** were White, **5%** were Hispanic/Latino, **4%** were Multiracial, and **2%** were other.



In family households, **71%** of people are Black and **14%** are White.



In **December**, **58%** of people experiencing homelessness were men, **41%** were women, **<1%** were non-binary, **1%** were transgender, and **<1%** were other.

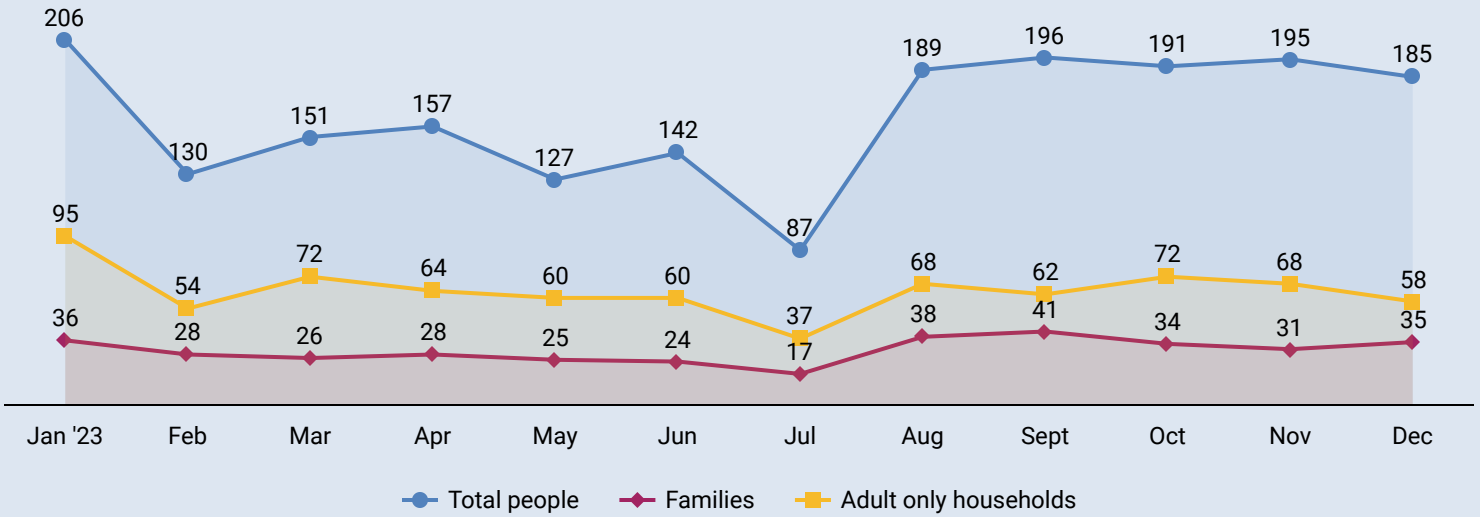


In adult only households, **41%** of people are Black and **49%** are White.

Nashville Housing Data, December 2023

185 people experiencing homelessness were housed in Nashville in **December 2023**. These 185 people were in **93 households**; **35 families** and **58 adult only households**. Over the past 12 months, **1,956 people** have been housed in Nashville.



Nashville housed 6% of the total people experiencing homelessness in November; 12% of the families and 3% of the adult only households.

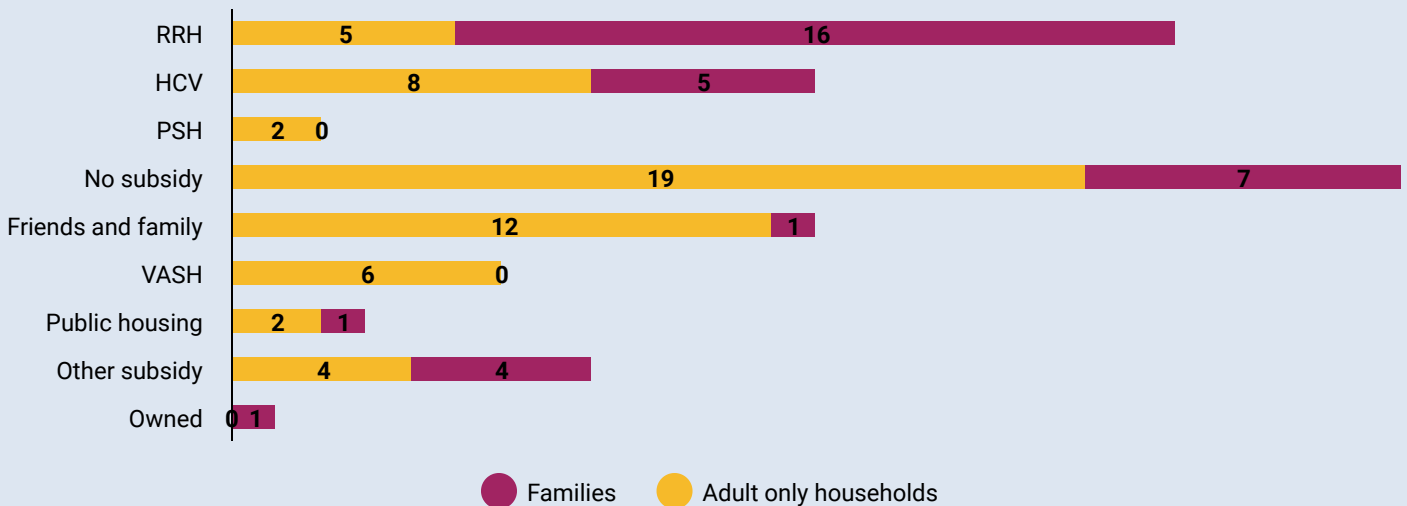

Number of housing exits by destination (households)

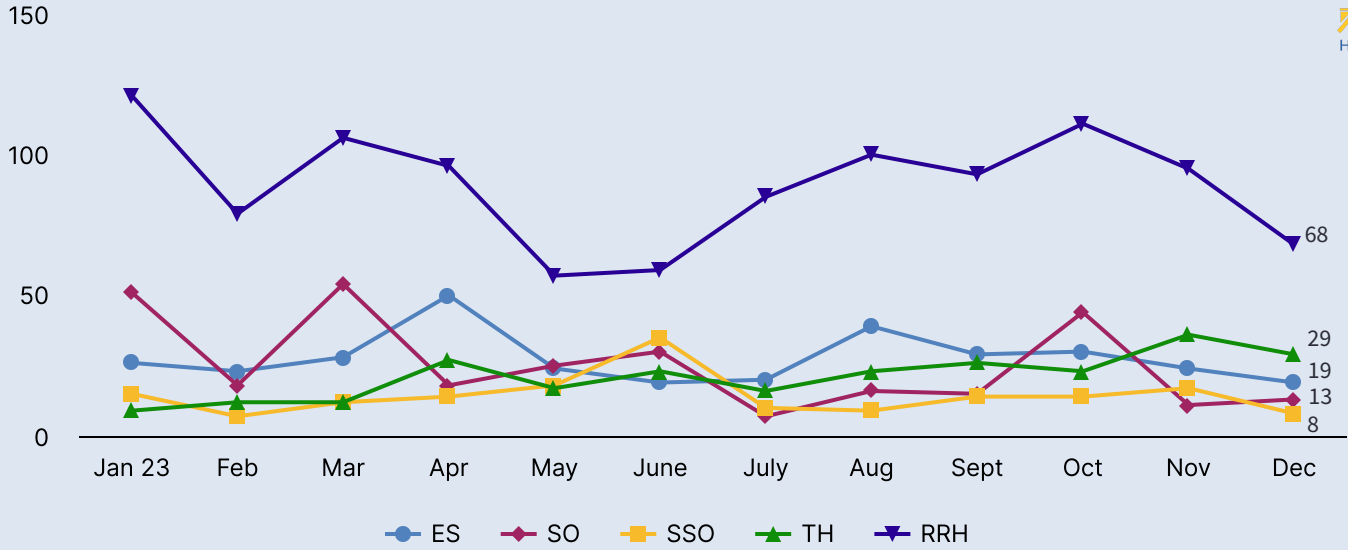


26 households were housed with no subsidy in **December**, followed by **21 households** who were housed with rapid re-housing subsidies, **13 households** who were housed with Housing Choice vouchers, and **13 households** housed with family and friends.

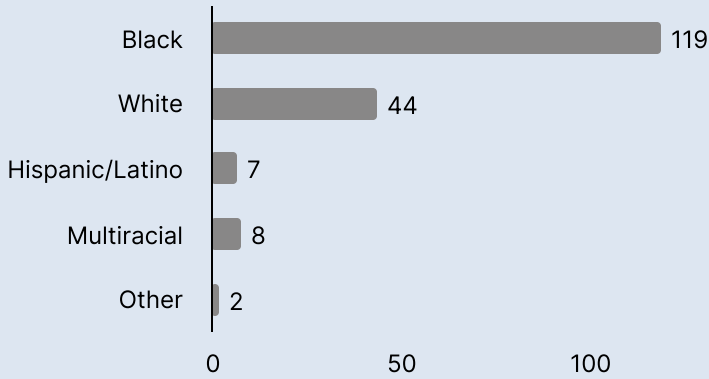

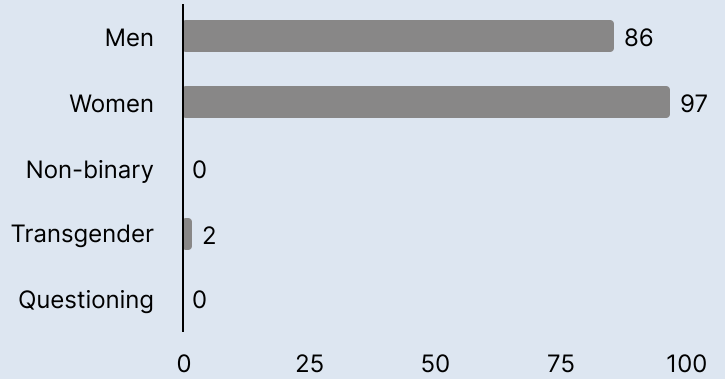
Number of people housed by program type, over time



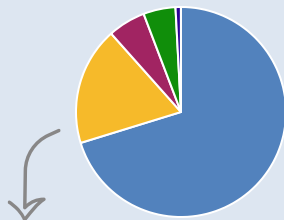
In **December**, **19** people experiencing homelessness were housed from Emergency Shelters, **13** from Street Outreach, **29** from Transitional Housing, **8** from Supportive Services Only, and **68** from Rapid Re-Housing.



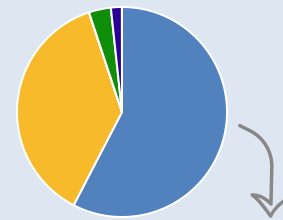
In **November**, **64%** of people housed were Black, **24%** were White, **4%** were Hispanic/Latino, **4%** were Multiracial, and **1%** were other.



In **December**, **46%** of people housed were men, **52%** were women, **0%** were non-binary, **1%** were transgender, and **0%** were other.



In family households, **67%** of people housed were Black and **17%** were White.



In adult only households, **58%** of people housed were Black and **37%** were White.

The top agencies who housed the most households in November were: **Operation Stand Down (20)**, **Safe Haven Family Shelter (17)**, and **The Salvation Army (15)**.
