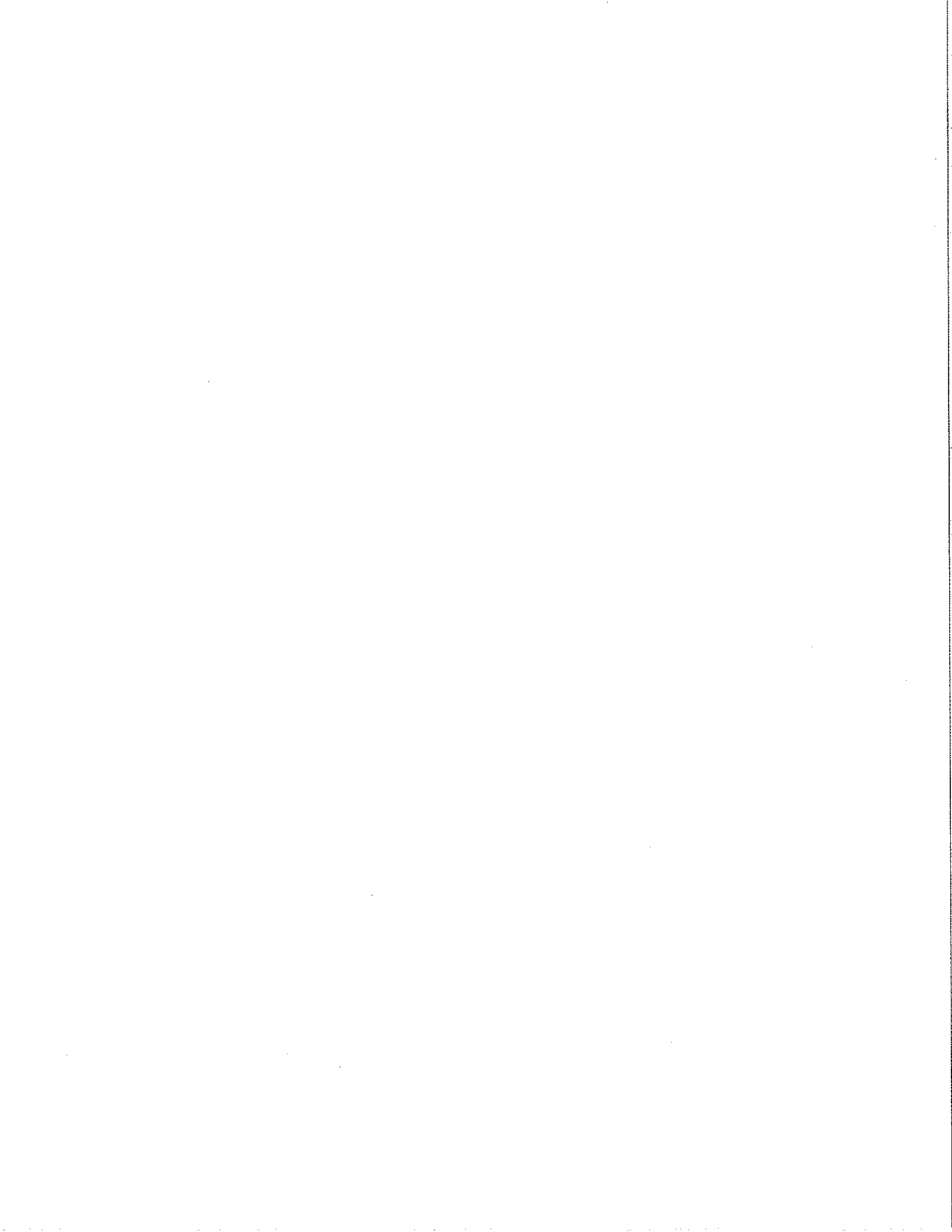

I feel strongly that residential neighborhoods in Nashville need to be spared the presence of LED signage of any kind. Residential neighborhoods each have their own personality made up of the homes that comprise them. LED signs are inconsistent with residential character and comfort and are not necessary just because it's the latest technology. Fox's Donut Den's (Green Hills) latest sign survey reveals that character and nostalgia make up a large part of what we call Nashville and "home" even in a commercial setting, but especially in a residential one. Dear Mr. Majors,

After hearing discussions from both sides of the issue concerning the proposed attraction at the Plowboy Mansion, I am offering the following in an attempt to reach a compromise for all parties concerned. Since the music venue appears to be a point of contention, I am asking the group who supports the music venue to:

1. Scale back the number of shows per month.
2. Create a sound barrier on three sides of the stage.
3. Face the stage to the East.
4. Locate the stage as far to the Northeast as possible.
5. Conduct sound levels to determine decibels from several locations.
6. Measure the distance from the stage to the point where the decibels are to be taken.

Given the adjustment being made by the Edge Group, I ask that the group who opposes the music venue to review its thoughts concerning this issue after the six items above have been taken by Edge, and provide a scenario to which the Plowboy attraction would be acceptable to all parties concerned.

I am hoping that, given the large number of acreage at this site, the components of this attraction can be placed or installed in a manner that would minimize or eliminate most or all of the unknown intrusions that might occur. At this point I believe that working together on this effort is worthwhile and will eventually enhance the Whites Creek community.
