RECOGNITION OF JEANETTE REAMS UPON HER RETIREMENT FROM METRO PARKS AFTER 32 YEARS OF SERVICE

Mr. Rick Taylor introduced Ms. Reams to the board and thanked her for 32 years of service with the Metropolitan Government with 25 of those years employed by Metro Parks. Ms. Reams began her employment with the General Services Department in 1983 and in 1991 she transferred to the Parks Department where she remained until her retirement in 2016. Ms. Reams began as a Building and Grounds Custodian and advanced to the position of Custodial Services Supervisor. Mr. Lynch thanked Ms. Reams for her dedication to Metro Parks and shared a statement she had made at her retirement celebration describing her time with Metro Parks with those in attendance . . . "I have lived a park life".

UPDATE ON THE 2016 PARKS AND GREENWAYS MASTER PLAN PRESENTED TO THE BOARD BY HAWKINS PARTNERS, INC.

Mr. Gary Hawkins, representing Hawkins Partners, Inc. was in attendance to present an update of the 2016 Parks and Greenways Master Plan to the board. Mr. Hawkins stated that the master plan is at the midway point of the process with a workshop and open house to be held at East Park on Saturday, August 27, 2016. He also stated that the value of parks is currently being collected and will be documented.

Since 1995, the memory of Davidson County homicide victims, ages 18 and under, have been honored in December at the Children's Garden during an annual **Season** to **Remember** ceremony. This memorial ceremony, sponsored by the Metro Police Department's Victim Intervention Program, the District Attorney's Office, You Have the Power, Tennessee Voices for Victims and the United States Attorney's Office, helps families ensure that homicide victims are not forgotten during the rush of the holiday season. During the service, relatives and friends of the victims will place Christmas ornaments on a tree in the Children's Garden in remembrance of their loved ones. There is also a lighting of the Menorah to commemorate Hanukkah, and the Kinara to commemorate Kwanzaa.

This garden has become an important sanctuary to those who have lost children to violence; therefore upon motion of Mr. Anderson, seconded by Dr. Brannon, the board grants approval to the request of staff that the Children's Garden will forever remain in Centennial Park.

XIV. REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR

Mr. Lynch reported:

August 3

- Marine Week is slated for Metro Council approval on Tuesday, August 16, 2016. This event is scheduled September 7 11, 2016 in Nashville and is hosted by a major city in the United States annually (held in Phoenix in 2015). The public will have the opportunity to check out a variety of Marine Corps' aircraft and other equipment throughout the week. The Marines will host a parade through downtown on Broadway as well as two live Marine Air-Ground Task Force demonstrations at Riverfront Park. In addition to the public events, the attending Marines will participate in community service events during the week that include reading to children during school visits, serving lunch at the Nashville Rescue Mission and visiting the Monroe Carell Jr. Children's Hospital at Vanderbilt.
- Beginning the process of determining the future for the site of the former Greer Stadium. Various groups have approached Metro Parks with recommendations to use the area as:

XIV. REPORT OF THE DIRECTOR (cont.)

Mr. Lynch reported:

Fort Negley was never open as a park to neighbors or the general public since its existence. From 1977 until 2014 the Sounds dominated usage of the park for approximately 305 days per year with Belmont and Trevecca Universities utilizing the facility during that time as well.

The Parks Board, Metro Planning Commission and 17th District Councilmember Sledge will meet before the September Board Meeting to determine a date for the Fort Negley/Greer public meeting.

- Mayor Barry's Infrastructure Committee, Parks, Public Works and Water Services are moving forward as the densification of Nashville evolves. Potential ways to fund Parks and Greenways hopefully will be accomplished with assistance of the Master Plan.
- The Tennessee Woman Suffrage Monument, Inc. has met all requirements as requested and the temporary location of the monument will be just that as TWSM desire their monument to be located permanently symmetrical to the John Thomas monument on the Great Lawn of Centennial Park. Donor names will eventually be listed; however, will just designate prominent Tennesseans currently in the elected process.
