Alice Thompson (1777-1828) married Rev. War veteran Edward Collinsworth (1759-1816) in Dec. 1795, after spending two years as a captive of a Muscogee (Creek) tribe. Alice and Edward raised seven children on land deeded to Alice by her brother John (c.1765-1791.) Their son James (1802-1838) was a signer of the Texas Declaration of Independence and First Chief Justice of the Tx. Supreme Court. Alice, Edward, daughter Parmelia and two more generations are buried at the nearby cemetery.
