



JUNE 2024 NEWSLETTER



Ten months after the stand-alone Office of Homeless Services' inception, we remain in a constant state of change. The status quo will not consume our department, but quite the opposite: efficiency, effectiveness, and efficacy.

Our Continuum of Care strategy is rooted in urgency, responsiveness, alignment, and accountability. It serves as a constant reminder that while we are settling into our new office space and homes, Nashville residents still need life-saving housing opportunities.

Even in a high-growth city, the OHS Landlord Engagement division has cultivated, secured, managed, and motivated more vacant housing units than our current voucher subsidy allotment can continue to pace. OHS is agile enough to operate innovatively even while standing firm on the efficacy of best practices. This approach allows us to problem-solve and meet the needs of the 90%. We continue to look at the gaps and bottlenecks in our community's system and strategically plan to resolve them with the entire system in mind, as seen by a record high last month of coordinating housing for 70 individuals experiencing chronic homelessness in one month (never done in the history of Nashville's housing practices.)

Over the past year, the Office of Homeless Services has been at the forefront of a collaborative effort with Nashville service providers. Together, we have made significant strides in housing Nashville neighbors. Notable community accomplishments: successfully transitioned 1927 people from shelters and unsheltered locations into stable housing. In addition, we have celebrated the collective effort to secure life-saving measures for 189 people in 4 encampments (90% retention rate). These actions, which align with national leaders such as USICH, Clutch Consulting, and National Alliance to End Homelessness, demonstrate our commitment to a comprehensive unified approach in addressing homelessness. In the coming months, the Office of Homeless Services will continue to prioritize the needs of our community. We are steadfast in our commitment to investing in prevention and diversion strategies, addressing family homelessness, and providing asset management for the new permanent supportive housing at Strobel House. Additionally, we are dedicated to building a baseline and comprehensive database to gather vital information on the unique needs of Nashville's neighbors, actually experiencing homelessness for an average of 5 years. This data will not only inform our strategic planning but also serve as a testament to our commitment to best practices and increased resource gathering.

LANDLORD ENGAGEMENT

The Landlord Engagement Team for the Office of Homeless Services manages the Low Barrier Housing Collective, a private-public partnership offering benefits to landlords willing to rent to people exiting homelessness.

The Low Barrier Housing Collective connects individuals and families exiting homelessness to private market units where landlords and property owners have agreed to lower housing barriers such as: rental history, credit history, and criminal history screening criteria.

Using modified applicant screening criteria, property owners and landlords that participate in the Low Barrier Housing Collective reduce existing housing barriers and significantly increase the amount of housing options available for individuals and families exiting homelessness. Property owners and landlords that participate in the Low Barrier Housing Collective also gain access to various benefits designed to provide monetary incentives and housing stabilization services where continuous support is provided to the landlord and tenant to foster a successful housing journey.

Sign-On Bonuses

New Landlord members may receive the following sign-on bonus amounts...

Shared Living: \$1000 2 Bedroom: \$3000 Studio: \$1500 3 Bedroom: \$3500 1 Bedroom: \$2500 4 Bedroom: \$4000

New Member Sign-On Bonus amounts are limited to the first 5 units leased-up to a tenant exiting homelessness.

Existing Landlord members receive an ongoing \$1000 sign-on bonus per lease up.

Minor Repairs

Landlords may receive up to \$2500 per unit for minor repairs to make a unit move-in ready (maximum of 5 units).

Application fees & Security Deposits

Landlords may receive up to \$500 per household to cover application fees and security deposits.

Furniture Allowance

Clients may be eligible to receive a onetime furniture allowance of up to \$1500 via our local furniture vendor partnership.

Partner Spotlight

Park Center is excited to announce the opening of its newest supportive housing units, located on Fairwin Ave and Pennock Ave in East Nashville. Park Center redeveloped these properties to create 14 new efficiency units for community members experiencing homelessness and living with mental health and substance use issues.





Each unit includes a bedroom, bathroom, and kitchenette with an apartment fridge, microwave, induction cooktop, and kitchen sink. Units are furnished with a bed, dresser, and nightstand, a task chair and table, and an armchair and TV. Units also feature individual minisplit HVAC systems to allow for personalized control of heating and cooling.

Residents will be members of Park
Center's Permanent Supportive
Housing (PSH) program, offering
tenancy support and customized
services to achieve personal goals
such as healthcare, employment, and
social connections. The program
follows the evidence-based Housing
First model, providing opportunities
for healing and growth, built on a
foundation of trauma-informed care,
peer support, and self-determination.

Capacity Building Grant Program

As part of the \$50 Million ARP Help & Hope investment from the City of Nashville, \$7 Million was allocated to the Low Barrier Housing Collective & Competitive Grants with \$3 Million allocated to the Low Barrier Housing Collective and \$4 Million to Competitive Grants. In late 2023, an RFP was issued seeking proposals for projects that would increase the capacity of the Nashville Continuum of Care, and five projects were awarded funds. Four of the five have been approved by Metro Council and are in the early stages of implementation. One project is still in progress.



Dismas House - Re-Entry Homelessness Prevention (\$205,763)

Dismas House seeks to build the capacity of the Nashville/Davidson County Continuum of Care to prevent homelessness by effectively and efficiently targeting housing navigation services and evidence-based support services to people exiting jails and prisons who are more likely to experience homelessness in Nashville. Dismas will implement primary prevention strategies that reduce the risk for housing instability and homelessness "upstream" before the individual requires assistance from Nashville's homeless response system.



Mending Hearts - Community Education Coordinator & Trainings (\$130,000)

This capacity building grant will increase organizational capacity to address those individuals experiencing homelessness and recently housed by providing life skills, home economics, and related training that can increase skills for successfully adjusting to being housed, integrating with society, and overcoming life challenges. The trainings will be available to the community, including Mend Me clients, Housing First partner clients, and other persons who may not yet be participating in Metro's Housing First programs.



Park Center - Housing Case Management for Chronic Homelessness (\$432,000)

This is a grant that extends the capacity for Park Center, Inc.'s Housing First case management services that allows them, while partnering with Empower Tennessee, to serve an additional 64 chronically homeless individuals with mental health and substance abuse disorders, and will provide Housing First case management services to 16 chronically homeless individuals with disabilities.



The Contributor - Homelessness Health & Housing (\$762,566)

This project is a two year collaboration between The Contributor, Vanderbilt University Medical Center Homeless Health Services (VUMC HHS), and Park Center. The aim of the project is to increase the capacity of the Nashville-Davidson County Continuum of Care to create seamless transitions between the Vanderbilt University Medical Center (VUMC) Emergency Department (ED), street medicine, and housing-focused solutions using a multidisciplinary team of clinicians and peer support specialists. This project will connect patients who are homeless needing healthcare to street medicine follow-up care, health insurance, and housing-focused supports including evidence-based case management services and the power of peer support.

The Mental Health Coop has been selected to receive funds from the Tennessee Department of Mental Health and Substance Abuse Services to establish a **Child and Adolescent Crisis Stabilization Unit** in Middle Tennessee, which will include a 15-bed unit, two observation beds, and a Walk-In-Center to serve youth ages 4 to 17. The Crisis Stabilization Unit will open in Spring 2025.
