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AGRICULTURE UPDATES

Ms. Dunlap this quarter presented at the Fall Gardener's Festival in Crossville at the UT Gardens on the Principles of Permaculture and had over one hundred participants. She hosted the UT-TSU Extension Butterfly Exhibit at the Nashville Fair in September. Released around four hundred butterflies. Provided educational resources to guests. Collaborated with Davidson County Master Gardeners. Gardens of Babylon donated all plants for a silent auction. Estimated around ten thousand attended the booth. She has began working with Metro Historical Commission on creating gardens and an educational space at the Sunnyside Mansion At Sevier Park. Working with Master Gardeners to plan out native garden beds and accompanying educational information on native plant gardening. She also provided educational horticulture presentations to local groups and organizations. Ms. Dunlap also continued partnerships and attended various partner meetings with Metro Nashville Water Services, Wild Ones of Middle Tennessee, Metro Tree Advisory Committee, Bates Nursery and Friends of Warner Parks.

We had 13 future farmers graduate from this program and become eligible for TAEP cost share. Ms. DeLozier continued to meet with producers and conduct farm visits. The Nashville fair was a large success with a beautiful fruit and vegetable competition, in which Ms. DeLozier oversaw. She also assisted with 4-H events at the fair and livestock shows. Ms. DeLozier has done presentations on business planning and farmer stress throughout July -September. She also continued the summer lunch and learn series with the most popular session being Poultry 101. Ms. Settles also attended a three-day health fair at Church of the Messiah. They also learned short-term challenge to drink less sugary drinks to increase their water intake and reading the Nutrition Facts on the Food label for awareness.
