How are CoC Program applications evaluated?

Applications are evaluated by the Performance Evaluation Committee (PEC). The PEC is composed of members that are not affiliated with agencies that are currently funded or applying for funding.

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For this reason, projects with lower scores may be ranked higher (or vice versa) by the PEC.

Data and HMIS Oversight Committee Priority Recommendation

Nashville has a high percentage of chronically homeless adult-only households in need of permanent supportive housing. These individuals are least likely to be housed in our community and if housed, they wait longer than others before they are housed and often aren't housed with the supports they need. Nashville's stock of resources does not match the needs of the community. Therefore, the Data and HMIS Oversight Committees recommend that local data be used as the foundation for strategic funding decisions so that funding more effectively meets the needs of people experiencing homelessness in Nashville. **Data shows that to fill the gap, Nashville should target projects that create new PSH units to serve people experiencing chronic homelessness and prioritize these projects for funding.**

How are CoC Program applications evaluated?

The PEC looks at factors including:

- Program structure
- Amount requested
- Racial equity
- Fidelity to Housing First
- HMIS participation
- CE participation
- Utilization rate
- Exits to positive housing destinations
- Participant income increase
- High need populations
- Past performance
- Community needs

System Performance Measures

The System Performance Measures *alone* account for 30% of points in the Consolidated Application.

- Average length of time homeless
- Returns to homelessness
- Number of homeless persons
- Increase in participant income
- First time homelessness
- Successful placement into permanent housing

NOTICE OF FUNDING OPPORTUNITY

- This year's Notice of Funding Opportunity (NOFO) has not yet been released. We do not know exactly when it will be released or when the deadline for the Consolidated Application will be.
- Last year, HUD identified the following policy priorities as selection criteria for the NOFO:
 - Ending homelessness for all persons
 - Use a Housing First approach
 - Reducing unsheltered homelessness
 - Improving system performance
 - Partnering with housing, health, and service agencies
 - Racial equity
 - Improving assistance to LGBTQ+ individuals
 - Involving persons with lived experience
 - Increasing the affordable housing supply

What are eligible supportive services?

- Annual assessment of services
- Moving costs
- Case management
- Childcare
- Education services
- Employment assistance and job training
- Food
- Housing search and counseling services
- Legal services
- Life skills training
- Mental health services
- Outpatient health services
- Outreach services
- Substance abuse treatment services
- Transportation
- Utility deposits

Program requirements

All CoC funded projects are required to comply with all federal rules and regulations listed in the NOFO. Requirements include, but are not limited to:

- Utilizing Housing First principles
- Participating in HMIS, or a comparable database (for victim service providers)
- Receiving all referrals through the CoC's Coordinated Entry process and participating fully in CE implementation
- Participating in the CoC as an active member

Updates to renewal application

As the new Collaborative Applicant, OHS has made some updates to this year's CoC Renewal Application.

The majority of the application has stayed the same.

Efforts were made to streamline the application and make it more straightforward.

We intend for this year's application to be submitted via an online system.

Updates to renewal application

Questions on the Renewal Application are generally meant to:

- Explain program structure, including utilization of best practices and project efficiencies
- Gauge alignment with community needs and priorities
- Gather information to guide future monitoring visits
- Gather information to strengthen the Consolidated Application

Tentative timeline

- Early June – Renewal Applications are distributed via CoC list serv
- Mid June – New Applications are distributed via CoC list serv
- Early July – due date for Renewal Applications
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- August – PEC rating and ranking
- September – Collaborative Application submitted in e-Snaps

DV Bonus Funding

DV Bonus projects are intended to meet the needs of survivors of domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, human trafficking, and stalking who qualify as Category 4 homeless.

Category 4 homelessness includes those fleeing or attempting to flee domestic violence, dating violence, sexual assault, stalking, or other dangerous or life-threatening conditions that relate to violence against the individual or a family member, including a child, that has either taken place within the individual's or family's primary nighttime residence or has made the individual or family afraid to return to their primary nighttime residence.

Who may apply for CoC Program funding?

To apply for CoC Program funding, an organization must be an eligible applicant as outlined in the CoC Program interim rule, which defines eligible applicants as **nonprofit organizations, States, local governments, and instrumentalities of State or local governments**. For-profit entities are not eligible to apply for grants or to be subrecipients of grant funds.

Who may apply for CoC Program funding?

Organizations apply for HUD funding through an annual competition process. An eligible applicant would need to submit a project application to the CoC's designated Collaborative Applicant organization. The CoC designates one organization to be the Collaborative Applicant. The Collaborative Applicant submits the complete application package which includes the CoC application and the individual project applications and their rankings.

What is the Collaborative Applicant?

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In the Nashville CoC, the Metro Nashville Office of Homeless Services has been designated as the Collaborative Applicant.

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Types of funding available

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- Supportive Services Only for CE Lead Agency (SSO-CE)

TYPES OF FUNDING AVAILABLE

- Rapid Re-Housing (RRH)
 - Emphasizes housing search and relocation services and short- and medium-term rental assistance to move homeless persons and families (with or without a disability) as rapidly as possible into permanent housing.
- Joint Transitional Housing / Rapid Re-Housing (TH-RRH)
 - Designed to provide homeless individuals and families with the interim stability and support to successfully move to and maintain permanent housing. Transitional Housing may be used to cover the costs of up to 24 months of housing with accompanying supportive services. Program participants must have a lease (or sublease) or occupancy agreement in place when residing in transitional housing. TH participants will then move into Rapid Re-Housing.

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TYPES OF FUNDING AVAILABLE

- Supportive Services Only – Coordinated Entry (SSO-CE)
 - May be used for a range of supportive services that directly relate to carrying out CE activities, such as conducting outreach to shelter and unsheltered homeless persons and families and connecting persons experiencing homelessness to housing and other resources
 - Victim service providers must have a separate CE process and a comparable database to track services due to confidentiality laws created by the Violence Against Women Act (VAWA)

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ELIGIBLE COSTS

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- Rehabilitation **RRH, TH-RRH, SSO-CE**
- New Construction **RRH, TH-RRH**
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What is the Continuum of Care (CoC)?

A Continuum of Care (CoC) is the group organized to carry out the responsibilities prescribed in the CoC Program Interim Rule for a defined geographic area.

A CoC should be composed of representatives of organizations including: nonprofit homeless providers, victim service providers, faith-based organizations, governments, businesses, advocates, public housing agencies, school districts, social service providers, mental health agencies, hospitals, universities, affordable housing developers, law enforcement, organizations that serve homeless and formerly homeless veterans, and homeless and formerly homeless persons.

What is the CoC Program?

The Continuum of Care (CoC) Program is designed to promote community-wide planning and strategic use of resources to address homelessness; improve coordination and integration with mainstream resources and other programs targeted to people experiencing homelessness; improve data collection and performance measurement; and allow each community to tailor its programs to the strengths and challenges in assisting homeless individuals and families within that community.

What is the CoC Program?

The CoC Program is designed to assist individuals (including unaccompanied youth) and families experiencing homelessness and provide the services needed to help such individuals move into transitional and permanent housing, with the goal of long-term stability.

Who may apply for CoC Program funding?

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TYPES OF FUNDING AVAILABLE

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 - Permanent housing with indefinite leasing or rental assistance paired with supportive services to assist homeless persons with a disability or families with an adult or child member with a disability achieve housing stability.
- Rapid Re-Housing (RRH)
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- Supportive Services Only – Coordinated Entry (SSO-CE)
 - May be used for a range of supportive services that directly relate to carrying out CE activities, such as conducting outreach to shelter and unsheltered homeless persons and families and connecting persons experiencing homelessness to housing and other resources
- Homeless Management Information System (HMIS)
 - Funds pay for leasing a structure in which the HMIS operations, for operating the structures in which the HMIS is housed, and/or for covering other costs related to establishing, operating, and customizing a CoC's HMIS.

These funds may be used only by the entities designated by the CoC to serve as the CE and HMIS Leads. Currently, both of those roles have been assigned to OHS.
